From the ministry team

It may seem like Christmas has only just gone (I must admit, I still have some Christmas decorations up as I write this in mid January!).

However, this year Easter is hot on Christmas' heels. It is one of the earliest dates it can be on 31 March (the earliest is actually 22 March); this means that Shrove Tuesday (AKA Pancake Day) is on 13 February and Ash Wednesday - the first day of Lent - is on Valentine's Day!

Lent is a time traditionally associated with fasting - the act of giving something up, of voluntarily going without. It is when the church remembers the 40 days that Jesus spent in the desert, without food or water. While we do not fast to such extremes, many Christians use the forty days to give up something they may consider a luxury, such as cake and biscuits, alcohol, or buying cut flowers; others may choose to take up something that helps their faith, such as a bible reading plan, or a Lent course. Some choose to give money to charity; some may do all three.

Lent can be a chance to deepen our relationship with God - whatever that may look like for you - remembering a time when Jesus withdrew from everyone to spend time with his Father, as he prepared for his life of service and ministry, leading to his death on the cross and his resurrection, that we celebrate at Easter.

The word 'Lent' comes from the Old English word for Spring. A time of new life and new beginnings. However we choose to mark this season, I pray that it is a time filled with the hope that the new life springing from the cold ground brings.

St Valentine's Day

Most people are probably aware that 14 February is St Valentine's Day, the day for lovers.

Saint Valentine's Day, many believe, was named after one or more Christian martyrs and was established by Pope Gelasius 1 in 496 AD. Valentine of Rome was martyred about 269, and this day usually 'belongs' to him.

The first recorded association of Valentine's Day with romantic love (1382) is from Geoffrey Chaucer. He wrote, '*For this was Saint Valentine's Day, when every bird cometh there to choose his mate.*' This poem was in honour of the first anniversary of the engagement of King Richard II of England to Anne of Bohemia.

Valentine's Day is referred to by Ophelia in Hamlet (1600-1601).

*To-morrow is St Valentine's day
All in the morning betime
And I a maid at your window
To be your Valentine.*

The modern mention of Valentine's Day can be found in a collection of English nursery rhymes (1784):

*The rose is red, the violet's blue
The honey's sweet, and so are you.
Thou are my love and I am thine
I drew thee to my Valentine.*

Our new Parish

The documentation creating our new combined parish of Downham with South Hanningfield and Ramsden Bellhouse was published on 14 December 2023 and came into force on 1 January 2024. By the time you read this we will have held a special Parochial Church Meeting to elect two churchwardens, who will have overall legal responsibility for the three churches. The only two nominations received by the closing date were Lee Baxter and Mike Roome, so we anticipate they will be elected and we thank them for their continued support. They will be ably assisted by Beryl Clements and Pauline Fordham who will continue to look after St Mary's Ramsden Bellhouse as assistant churchwardens. For the past two years St Peter's South Hanningfield has been unable to elect churchwardens, but their 'Mission Control' team do excellent work looking after the church and its services.

The existing Parochial Church Council members from the three churches will

remain in office until the Annual Church Meetings which will be held sometime in May. We will then elect a new PCC for the new parish and we hope that all three churches will be actively represented on that new body.

The new parish remains part of the Reservoir Group of Churches with Stock and West Hanningfield. Going forward we hope to work more closely with them.

Lent 2024

As the Revd Jacqui has said in her introduction, Lent this year starts on Ash Wednesday 14 February. There will be two services within the Reservoir Group that day. Holy Communion with the imposition of ashes at All Saints' Stock at 10.00am and Sung Eucharist with the imposition of ashes at St Margaret's Downham at 7.30pm. We hope to see you at one of the services.

Looking back to Christmas

The January edition of *The Herald* was printed before Christmas so we were unable to review our Christmas services last month. On 11 December we were able to welcome children from Downham school for their carol service. This was for the first time since Covid. Our ever popular Christingle service took place on Saturday 23 December. We are not sure if this confused some of our regulars because the number of worshippers was down a little on 2022, however, those who attended were generous with their giving and we were able to send £400 to The Childrens' Society. In a letter of thanks they indicated that they receive donations from over 2,000 Christingle services during the Christmas season. Whilst the totals for 2023 are not available yet in 2022 they received nearly £600,000 to help children and young people.

Churchyard tidy up day

On Monday 12 February at 10.00am we will be gathering at St Margaret's for the annual clear up of Christmas wreaths and all the other debris which we seem to accumulate over the Christmas period. In addition to collecting rubbish we will prune plants and roses, as appropriate and cut back any bushes which need attention.

We will also give the kitchen, wash-rooms and windows a thorough clean. Over the past few years we have had on average, about 15 members of the church family who have been able to turn up. If you are able to give up a couple of hours, we will be very grateful. Please bring your secateurs or Marigolds, depending on the jobs you wish to undertake.

All in the month of February

It was:

150 years ago, on 15 February 1874 that Sir Ernest Shackleton was born. This Irish-born British polar explorer was one of the leading explorers during the Heroic Age of Antarctic Exploration. He led three British expeditions to the Antarctic.

100 years ago, on 5 February 1924 that BBC Radio broadcast the 'six-pips' Greenwich Time Signal for the first time.

Also 100 years ago, on 12 February 1924 that George Gershwin's Rhapsody in Blue was performed for the first time, in New York.

90 years ago, on 23 February 1934 that Edward Elgar, the British composer, died.

75 years ago, on 22 February 1949 that Niki Lauda, Austrian racing driver was born. He was Formula One World Champion in 1975, 1977 and 1984. He was severely injured and burnt in a crash at the 1976 German Grand Prix.
(Died 2019.)

70 years ago, on 23 February 1954 that the first field test of the polio vaccine began in Pittsburgh. It grew into a year-long national trial involving 1.8 million children.

65 years ago, 3 February 1959, became 'the day the music died', when American rock-and-roll performers Buddy Holly, Ritchie Valens and The Big Bopper were killed in a plane crash in Iowa.

60 years ago, on 7 February 1964 that the Beatles arrived in New York for their first US tour. They were met by thousands of screaming fans.

50 years ago, on 7 February 1974 that Conservative Prime Minister Edward Heath called a snap general election following the miners' strike and three-day week. It resulted in a hung parliament, and the Labour leader, Harold Wilson, became Prime Minister.

40 years ago, on 14 February 1984 that figure skaters Jayne Torvill and Christopher Dean won the gold medal in ice-skating at the Winter Olympics in Sarajevo. They scored the first perfect 6.0 in Olympic history.

30 years ago, on 25 February 1994 that serial killer Fred West was arrested in connection with the disappearance of his daughter. Police then discovered human bones buried in his garden. He was eventually charged with 11 murders, and his wife Rosemary with ten murders.

25 years ago, on 1 February 1999 that the International Maritime Organisation stopped using the Morse code 'SOS' distress call. All sea-going vessels were

required to have a Global Maritime Distress and Safety System (GMDSS) fitted by this date.

20 years ago, on 4 February 2004 that Facebook, the social media networking platform, was launched.

15 years ago, on 7 February 2009 that the Black Saturday bushfires took place in Australia. The worst in Australia's history, they destroyed 1.1 million acres of land, killed 173 people, injured 414, and burned down more than 3,500 buildings, including 2,000 houses.

What do you know about the church organ?

Over the Christmas period, if you count carol singing in the Old Windmill pub, I played the organ for 10 services across our three churches. Christmas is a busy time for church musicians, but also very rewarding. During that period, I had two conversations about church organs with members of the congregation and I thought it was worth sharing them with you.

The first question was "*why do we use organs in church, why not the piano?*" The organ is an ancient instrument. It is believed they were invented by the Greeks around 200BC and later developed by the Romans. We may have heard the story that Emperor Nero fiddled whilst Rome burned. That would have been impossible because violin type instruments did not appear until around the eleventh century, so perhaps he was an early organist. It is thought that organs were first introduced into churches in the eighth century and by the time of the Renaissance they had developed into the instrument we know today. The piano is a much newer instrument, having been invented during the eighteenth century. The organ has the power to fill a large space, such as a church, with sound. The early pianos, and other keyboard instruments such as the harpsichord could not do that. It was only in the nineteenth century that cast iron frames were added to pianos enabling them to produce a greater volume. Perhaps I am biased, but I still don't think the piano works well when accompanying traditional hymns in church although it has its place with modern worship songs.

The second question was "*how old is the organ?*" The instruments at both Ramsden Bellhouse and South Hanningfield date from the late nineteenth century and instruments of around this date can be found in many of our local churches. We probably remember from history lessons at school being told that Oliver Cromwell closed theatres and abolished Christmas. Whilst that is a general misconception, the Puritan movement in the Church came to prominence in the 1640s at the time of the English Civil War and England certainly became more austere. Organs that were then in parish churches were ripped out. Whilst singing in church was not forbidden, it was severely

restricted. In the meantime, chorales, what we now know as hymns, were being composed and sung in Europe, especially in Germany where composers such as JS Bach rose to prominence during the seventeenth century. John Wesley broke away from the Church of England in the eighteenth century to found the Methodist church with his brother Charles who was a prolific hymn writer. It is not surprising that worshippers in Methodist churches found hymns more inspiring to sing than the metrical psalms that were the mainstay of Church of England worship. With worshippers drifting away to the Methodists and other free churches Church of England clergy started to introduce hymns into worship, much to the chagrin of churchwardens at the time. In 1819 the churchwardens of St Paul's Sheffield so objected to their vicar's wish to introduce hymn singing that they tried to deprive him of his living by bringing an action against him in the York Consistory Court (Holy & Ward v Cotterill). Although they won their case no penalty was imposed on him, and he remained as their vicar. Tacit approval for hymn singing was given by the Archbishop of York and in 1861 the first edition of Hymns Ancient and Modern was published. This was so popular that within a few years most Church of England churches were introducing pipe organs, or harmoniums (reed organs) to accompany hymn singing. Unfortunately, there was no ready supply of trained organists therefore they were often played by mediocre pianists, giving the organ a somewhat tarnished reputation amongst musicians which sadly remains to this day.

20 years of Facebook

Twenty years ago, on 4 February 2004, Facebook, the social media networking platform, was launched.

Originally known as thefacebook.com, it was intended by Mark Zuckerberg and four other Harvard students – Eduardo Saverin, Andrew McCollum, Dustin Moskovitz and Chris Hughes – to create “a directory of information for college students”, but it soon expanded, and each of the five co-founders developed different roles. All except Moskovitz are now not part of the Facebook empire, but all are extremely rich.

A year after it was launched, Facebook lost the “the” from its name, and the following year it got rid of its students-only restriction. In its new form Zuckerberg, from an early stage the main man of Facebook, said the original aim was for Facebook users to take their online identities with them around the internet without having to register individual accounts for each website or app.

The swift development of Facebook, which went public in 2012, has involved Zuckerberg in many lawsuits, and he has demonstrated a wide-ranging ability to win people over. He is also extremely clever. He has never revealed his own political affiliation or voting history, and is hard to pin down. He was raised as a Reform Jew, went through a period when he espoused atheism, but more recently has said he “believes religion is very important”.

In September last year his net worth was estimated at not far short of £50 billion, but he receives a one-dollar salary as CEO of Facebook, and he and his wife Priscilla Chan give away huge amounts of money, some of which goes to fighting antisemitism and backing educational and community initiatives. Facebook is banned in China.

As of late September 2023, Forbes estimated Zuckerberg's net worth at about \$64.4 billion, making him the 16th-richest person in the world.







It can be read in the Bible in Exodus 2:13-4:23, 4:27-5:2






