An Invitation to the Feast

Today I was having lunch in one of our local pubs and - now that Christmas is done for another year - there were roses and hearts everywhere, with a big board reminding you that Valentines Day is fast approaching, and it is the perfect opportunity to treat that special person to a special meal. Social media is similarly full of lovely ways to show just how much they mean to you.

They say food is the language of love (or at least I feel like someone has said that at some point), which may be true.

And it appears to be true for God as well.

The Bible talks a lot about food - and Jesus is recorded as eating a lot of food. Luke's account of Jesus' life, death, and resurrection, is full of Jesus joining others for meals - and not just his friends either. On one occasion he is invited to a meal by a man called Levi. The people there - "tax collectors and sinners" - were not considered by many at the time to be the "right" sort of people for Jesus to be hanging out with, but he did any way (Luke 5.27-32).

More than that, we are all invited to a feast with Jesus. When the Bible talks about Heaven it often likens it to a banquet - a huge feast where all are welcome.

If food really is the language of love, then Jesus invites all to sit at the table with him and know that they are loved. That invitation is open to all, regardless of your own plans for Valentines Day!

Valentine's Day - 14 February

There are two confusing things about this day of romance and anonymous love-cards strewn with lace, cupids and ribbon: firstly, there seems to have been two different Valentines in the 4th century - one a priest martyred on the Flaminian Way, under the emperor Claudius, the other a bishop of Terni martyred at Rome. And neither seems to have had any clear connection with lovers or courting couples.

So why has Valentine become the patron saint of romantic love? By Chaucer's time the link was assumed to be because on these saints' day - 14 February - the birds are supposed to pair. Or perhaps the custom of seeking a partner on St Valentine's Day is a surviving scrap of the old Roman Lupercalia festival, which took place in the middle of February. One of the Roman gods

honoured during this Festival was Pan, the god of nature. Another was Juno, the goddess of women and marriage. During the Lupercalia it was a popular custom for young men to draw the name of a young unmarried woman from a name-box. The two would then be partners or 'sweethearts' during the time of the celebrations. Even modern Valentine decorations bear an ancient symbol of love - Roman cupids with their bows and love-arrows.

There are no churches in England dedicated to Valentine, but since 1835 his relics have been claimed by the Carmelite church in Dublin.

All in the month of February

It was:

175 years ago, on 23 February 1850 that Cesar Ritz, the Swiss hotelier, was born. He founded several notable hotels including the Ritz and Carlton Hotels in London, and the Hotel Ritz in Paris.

125 years ago, on 27 February 1900 that the Labour Party was founded in the UK.

Also 125 years ago, on 27 February 1900, that the German football club FC Bayern Munich was founded.

90 years ago, on 22 February 1935 that US President Franklin D Roosevelt banned aircraft from flying over the White House – because the noise kept him awake at night. The ban remains in place today, but mainly now for security reasons.

Also 90 years ago, on 26 February 1935 that British radio engineer Robert Warson-Watt demonstrated a working radar system for the first time, in Daventry.

80 years ago, during February 1945 that Anne Frank died . The young Dutch Jewish diarist and Holocaust victim died in Bergen-Belsen concentration camp at the age of 15, probably from typhus.

Also 80 years ago, from 4 to 11 February 1945 that the Yalta Conference

took place in Crimea. US President Franklin D Roosevelt, Winston Churchill and Joseph Stalin met to plan the final defeat of Nazi Germany. Stalin also agreed to enter the war in the Pacific, within three months of the war in Europe ending.

Also 80 years ago, on 6 February 1945 that Bob Marley, the Jamaican reggae/ ska/rock steady singer, songwriter was born. He became a musician and cultural icon (died 1981).

Also 80 years ago, from 13 to 15 February 1945 that the bombing of Dresden took place. The Allies carried out four massive bombing raids, completely destroying the inner city, and killing about 25,000 people.

Also 80 years ago, from 19 February to 26 March 1945 that the Battle of Iwo Jima, Japanese volcanic islands, took place. The iconic photo of US Marines triumphantly rising the American flag on top of Mount Surabachi was taken on 23 February.

Also 80 years ago, on 21 February 1945 that Eric Liddell, Scottish athlete, died. An Olympic gold medallist in 1924 (400 m), he had withdrawn from the 100m heat because it was held on a Sunday and entered the 400m instead. The story is featured in the film Chariots of Fire. (Liddell died in a WWII internment camp in China, aged 43.)

75 years ago, on 8 February 1950 that the world's first payment by credit card took place. The founders of Diners Club (now Diners Club International) used it to pay their restaurant bill at Majero's Cabin Grill in New York City.

75 years ago, on 9 February 1950 that the Red Scare began in the USA. US Senator Joseph MacCarthy announced that he had a list of "known communists" who worked in the US State Department. He went on to make further sensational claims that Communists, Soviet spies and sympathisers were in the federal government and US Army. None of these claims could be substantiated.

70 years ago, from 24 February 1955 to March that Britain's Big Freeze took place. Deep snow and freezing temperatures caused havoc, with many places cut off. The RAF dropped food and medical supplies to affected areas, while thousands of sheep died from exposure.

65 years ago, on 8 February 1960 that the Hollywood Walk of Fame was established in Hollywood. It consists of more than 2,700 stars embedded in the pavement, that bear the names of notable figures from the entertainment industry.

Also 65 years ago, on 8 February 1960 that Queen Elizabeth II issued an Order-in-Council stating that she and her family would be known as the House of Windsor, and that her descendants would use the surname Mountbatten-Windsor.

50 years ago, on 11 February 1975 that Margaret Thatcher became the first female leader of the Conservative Party. She became Britain's first female Prime Minister in 1979.

Also 50 years ago, on 14 February 1975 that P G Wodehouse died. This well-loved British-born American comic novelist, short story writer, lyricist and playwright is best known as the creator of Jeeves.

40 years ago, on 7 February 1985 that the Mayor of New York City, Ed Koch, adopted the song New York, New York by Frank Sinatra as the city's official anthem.

Also 40 years ago, on 16 February 1985 that the Islamic militant group and political party Hezbollah was founded in Lebanon.

30 years ago, on 2 February 1995 that the leaders of Egypt, Jordan, Israel and the Palestine Liberation Organisation held an emergency summit in Cairo, where they reaffirmed their commitment to the Middle East peace process.

Also 30 years ago, on 16 February 1995 that the environmental campaign group Greenpeace discovered Shell's plan to dump its defunct Brent Spar oil rig in the Atlantic. It launched an international campaign to stop it, and the rig eventually was taken to Norway where it was dismantled and parts of it were used to extend a quay.

Also 30 years ago, on 23 February 1995 that James Herriot, veterinary surgeon and best-selling author, died. Best known for his autobiographical book All Creatures Great and Small, which was adapted into a popular TV series.

Also 30 years ago, on 26 February 1995 that Barings Bank, the oldest merchant bank in London, collapsed after its chief trader in Singapore, Nick Leeson, lost £827 million on unauthorised transactions.

25 years ago, from 11 February to 29 May 2000 that the British government suspended the Northern Ireland Assembly, after it failed to strike a deal on decommissioning IRA weapons.

20 years ago, on 7 February 2005 that yachtswoman Ellen MacArthur broke the record for the fastest solo circumnavigation of the globe, gaining international renown.

Also 20 years ago, on 10 February 2005 that Charles, Prince of Wales, and Camilla Parker Bowles announced their engagement. They were married on 9 April 2005.

Also 20 years ago, on 10 February 2005, that North Korea confirmed it had nuclear weapons.

Also 20 years ago, on 14 February 2005 that YouTube, the online videosharing service, was founded. It was purchased by Google in 2006. Also 20 years ago, on 16 February 2005 that the Kyoto Protocol came into effect. The international treaty obliges industrialised nations to reduce their greenhouse gas emissions.

15 years ago, on 18 February 2010 that Wikileaks published the first classified documents leaded by US Army intelligence analyst Chelsea Manning. In total, she sent Wikileaks nearly 750,000 sensitive documents. She was arrested and served seven years in prison.

10 years ago, on 27 February 2015 that Leonard Nimroy, actor and film director, died. Best known for his role as Spock in the Star Trek films and TV series.

The new trend of clapping in church

Some people are beginning to clap in church, if they are pleased with something.

For tired vicars and timid curates, having a sermon greeted with warm clapping might be an encouragement, if also a complete surprise.

But the applauding of sermons, or applause at the end of services, also reveals a dark side: churchgoing has now declined to such a degree in the UK, that even the knowledge of 'how to behave' in church is fading.

That leaves some people unaware that in the UK, aside from a few 'mega churches' where American style singing, dancing and clapping is the norm, applause is not something we 'do' in church.


As one vicar puts it: "I think it has to do with cultural expectations. People are less and less familiar with acts of worship directed to God. Instead, they have a sense of a performance."

This article has appeared in the Press recently. What do you think about clapping in church? As organist of our three churches, I sometimes get applause after my final voluntary, especially when I play something perhaps a little more showy than normal. I'm pleased when I get it. It shows appreciation for the work I have done to prepare it.

Just before Christmas the Revd Jean and I attended a carol service in the City of London organised by my City Livery Company. At the end of the service the organist and choir received loud applause for splendid music. A bishop and other senior clergy who were there did not appear to object, they joined in. Perhaps if the clapping occurred during the service they would have been less accommodating.


