Meeting of Parishioners to elect churchwardens for the new parish of Downham with Ramsden Bellhouse and South Hanningfield

Wednesday 24 January 7.00pm at St Margaret's Downham

Everyone is welcome to attend, but to vote at the meeting you must be on the electoral roll of the new parish, or be resident in the parish and on the local authority electoral roll.

Pastoral reorganisation of our parishes

Last year we reported on proposals to reorganise the administrative responsibilities of our three churches to make them easier to manage. Because of the Church of England's status as the established Church in England it was necessary to petition Parliament to seek permission for the reorganisation. At the time of writing (7 December) we haven't received the formal parliamentary approval, but Chelmsford diocese has told us to assume the new arrangements will be effective from 1 January 2024.

What does that mean for our three churches?

Those who worship at St Margaret's, St Mary's or St Peter's are unlikely to notice any changes. We already worship together at least once a month, and hopefully more people will venture from their "home" church to join us at these joint services. People living in the parish will now be able to get married or be buried, subject to space being available, at any of the three churches.

All Church of England churches are governed by a Parochial Church Council (PCC) which has the same legal status as a limited company. Members of the PCC act as its directors and also its charity trustees. The pastoral reorganisation will merge the PCCs of St Margaret's, St Mary's and St Peter's into a single PCC to be known as the Parochial Church Council of Downham with Ramsden Bellhouse and South Hanningfield. The first thing we need to do is to elect churchwardens for the new parish. This will take place at a special Meeting of Parishioners scheduled for 24 January. Members of the existing three PCCs will continue until the Annual Parochial Church Meetings which will take place after Easter when a new PCC will be elected.

From 1 January a single set of accounts will be maintained, but donations and fundraising activities will still be recorded against each of the three churches. Where restricted funds are in existence, for example the maintenance fund for St Margaret's, they will continue to be restricted for use on the designated church. As the combined income of the three churches is around £100,000pa, we will have to register the new PCC as a charity with the Charity Commission. This should make it easier to prove our charitable status when seeking funding.

The reorganisation was prompted mainly by the difficulty of recruiting people as churchwardens or PCC members. Since Derek Greasley's death in March 2022, St Peter's has had no churchwardens at all. However the past year has seen the creation of an active "mission control" team at St Peter's, people who are willing to look after the church, organise events, prepare the church for services and welcome visitors, but who don't want the legal responsibilities of being a churchwarden or PCC member. We are very grateful for everything they do and hope that this model can be replicated in the other two churches.

Dear Brothers and Sisters

January is a time of both looking back and looking forwards - indeed it the very nature of the ancient Roman god, Janus, after whom the month is named, with his two faces; one looking back and the other looking ahead.

For the Parishes of St Margaret's Downham, St Mary's Ramsden Bellhouse, and St Peter's South Hanningfield, the new year represents a significant moment in their history, as the three parishes legally become one. Over the last few years the churches have been working together, and worshipping together, more and more. Becoming one parish will enable the practical aspect of church life, such as PCC (Parochial church council) meetings to be more efficient and less demanding on time. It will, I pray, continue to foster a sense that we are all part of one community, whichever village we live in, or church (or churches) we attend. A community that looks out for one another, supports one another; that celebrates the good together and sees us through the difficult times together. Modern life spreads beyond the traditional boundaries of parishes and villages, yet the need to be a part of a close knit and supportive community is as important as ever.

The reorganisation is a time to look forward to the future, but also to look back and celebrate the past. Each of the three churches, and their communities, have a rich history. We are truly blessed with three beautiful, unique, churches. Each one needs love, care, and many people generous with time and money, to maintain the buildings and churchyards. The churches will continue to strive to be places where people can come together, to connect with God and with each other, as they have been doing for hundreds of years.

We will be formally marking the joining of the three parishes at Pentecost in May (look out for more information to follow!). At Pentecost, Jesus gave the Holy Spirit to his disciples. He then sent them out, to spread the Good News of his love as far and wide as they could. They founded church communities all over the known world, and the message continued to spread - and our ancient churches are a testament to the faithfulness of those who spread that news. As the three parishes join together, our mission remains the same. To herald the Good News of Jesus Christ - of his forgiveness, of his hope, of his love - to all the villages and beyond.

I wish you all a very happy and blessed 2024!

St Paul, the first Christian intellectual

This month, on 25 January, the Church celebrates probably the most famous conversion of all. At least, what happened to a young man called Saul on the road to Damascus has become a byword for all instant conversions - what is known as a 'damascene' moment. Saul was a devout Jew, a Pharisee, a student of Gamaliel and a fierce critic of the followers of Jesus, then a very new sect on the religious scene.

On his way to Damascus to start a purge of Christians in that city, he was blinded by a bright light and heard a voice saying, 'Saul, Saul, why are you persecuting me?' He asked the identity of the voice, and was told: 'Jesus, whom you are persecuting'. Stunned by the experience, he followed further instructions which led him to a Christian man in Damascus, who prayed with him. As he did, Saul's sight was restored.

The experience convinced Paul that Jesus - crucified in Jerusalem four or five years earlier - was in fact the Messiah and had risen from the dead. After a period of instruction, Saul was baptised and took the name Paul. At first, some Christians were wary about the reality of his conversion, but over a period of time he was accepted and indeed eventually recognised as an 'apostle', a 'special messenger' of Jesus Christ.

His intellectual stature and leadership gifts quickly marked him out, and within a few years he became a leading figure in the emerging Christian Church, preaching and founding churches all over the Middle East, largely of Gentile converts. He was eventually martyred in Rome, probably in 65AD.

Paul was the first intellectual of the Christian Church, the man who was able to

set the events of the life and teaching of Jesus, and especially His death and resurrection, into a coherent theology, with its roots very clearly in the Jewish faith of his own upbringing.

Many people think of Paul as a rather negative, narrow misogynist, but even a quick reading of his letters actually reveals a person of great warmth, who evoked enormous affection and devotion from others. 'You would have plucked out your eyes and given them to me!' he writes to the Christians at Galatia. As for the charge that Paul disliked women, even a quick read of his letters will reveal how large a role women played in his churches. In terms of the first century, St Paul was a dangerous liberal! So, all in all, the amazing Paul of Tarsus deserves a bit of celebrating on 25 January.

All in the month of January

It was:

700 years ago, on 8 January 1324 that Marco Polo died. This Venetian/Italian merchant, explorer and writer is best known for his book *The Travels of Marco Polo*, which detailed his travels along the Silk Road in Asia.

200 years ago, on 8 January 1824 that Wilkie Collins, British novelist and playwright was born. Best known for *The Woman in White* and *The Moonstone*, which is regarded as the first modern British detective novel.

175 years ago, on 13 January 1849 that the Colony of Vancouver Island was established. It became part of Canada in 1871.

150 years ago, on 25 January 1874 that Somerset Maugham, British playwright, novelist and short story writer, was born. One of the most popular writers of his era.

125 years ago, on 20 January 1899 that Clarice Cliff, British ceramic artist, was born.

100 years ago, on 21 January 1924 that Vladimir Lenin, Russian Communist leader, died. He was the architect and first head of the Soviet Union.

Also 100 years ago, on 22 January 1924 that Ramsay MacDonald became Britain's first Labour Prime Minister.

Also 100 years ago, on 26 January 1924 that the Russian city of St Petersburg was renamed Leningrad. Its name was changed back in 1991.

80 years ago, on 17 January to 18 May 1944 that the WW2 Battle of Monte Cassino, Italy, took place. This Allied victory is regarded as the hardest-fought and bloodiest battle of the war, with around 250,000 casualties.

Also 80 years ago, on 23 January 1944 that Edvard Munch, Norwegian artist, died. Best known for *The Scream*.

75 years ago, on 10 January 1949 that RCA launched the 7-inch 45-rpm vinyl record, commonly known as the single.

Also 75 years ago, on 26 January 1949 that the 200-inch (five metre) Hale Telescope at the Palomar Observatory in California was used for the first time. It was the world's largest optical telescope until 1976, and it is still in active use.

65 years ago, on 12 January 1959 that the Motown record label was founded in Detroit, Michigan by Berry Gordy.

60 years ago, on 11 January 1964 that the US Surgeon General published a report which concluded that cigarette smoking caused lung cancer and chronic bronchitis. This was the first official US government report on the health issues of smoking.

50 years ago, from 1 January to 6 Mar, 1974, a three-day working week was introduced in the UK, in order to conserve coal supplies (used by power stations) during a miners' strike.

40 years ago, on 22 January 1984 that the first Apple Macintosh computer went on sale.


25 years ago, on 1 January 1999 that the euro officially became the new currency in 11 European countries.


