

Annual Parochial Church Meeting

The Church, like all charities, is required to hold an Annual General Meeting to give reports to members on its activities, finances and future plans during the previous financial year, as well as to elect trustees for the coming year. Because the three churches of St Margaret's Downham, St Peter's South Hanningfield and St Mary's Ramsden Bellhouse are now all part of one parish we will be holding just one AGM at St Margaret's Downham on Wednesday 28 May, commencing at 7.00pm.

Electoral Roll

Whilst everyone is encouraged to come along to the AGM, in order to vote or seek election as a trustee, it is necessary for you to be on the church electoral roll. As mentioned in the January edition of *The Herald* Church regulations require us to prepare a completely new electoral roll every six years and a new roll has to be prepared this year. At the time of writing fewer than 50% of people on the old roll have completed a new form. Forms are available in each of the three churches and can be downloaded from our website www.downhamchurch.org.uk The closing date for receipt of forms is 14 May.

Election of officers

The charity trustees consist of ex-officio and elected members. This year we will be electing two churchwardens for a one year term, but when the new parish was created last year we elected members of the Parochial Church Council for a three year term in order to give us stability during the transition. From 2026 a third of the PCC members will seek re-election each year so there will be no election this year, but the PCC has the power to co-opt additional members.

However, we still have two vacancies for representatives on the Chelmsford Deanery Synod. This is the first rung of the Church of England's Synodical Government and represents all the churches around Chelmsford. The synod normally meets for an evening session four times a year. Members of synod are ex-officio members of the church's PCC. Please consider seeking election to one of these vacancies. If you would like to learn more about what happens at the Deanery Synod, please speak to the Revd Jacqui or to Robert Andrews who are both members of the Synod.

Finances

Copies of the annual report and accounts for the year to 31 December 2024 are available in each church. Total income for the year was £79,303 and total expenditure was £77,588.

Pray for Peace

Peace is a very precious thing. As we commemorate the 80th anniversary of VE Day this month, I am reminded once again just how fortunate I am to have lived my whole life so far in a country that is at peace. I know that the pain and upheaval of the Second World War is still a present reality for many. I know that I only have to turn on the news to see reports and images of wars and conflicts currently taking place in Ukraine, Gaza, Sudan, and Yemen - and then there are the conflicts that do not make the news cycle. Our world is far from being at peace.

The dove is often used as a symbol of peace. It comes originally from the Old Testament story of Noah. The dove brought back a green twig - proof that the flood waters were receding. Proof that Noah, his family, and all of the animals, would soon be able to walk on dry land again.

Wars are like a flood - wiping out everything in their path and displacing many. How many millions around the world are longing for a sign that they can return to their home where violence has driven them out?

Peace is something we pray for regularly in church. Jesus, who was called the Prince of Peace - said: 'Blessed are the peacemakers, for they will be called Children of God.' Peace is precious, and precious to God are those who work for peace, both in their own countries and on foreign soil. Peace is something we can all work towards - in big and small ways - and to pray for.

So as we mark 80 years since VE day this May (and 80 years since VJ day in August), here is a prayer for world peace, written by the Church of England, that you might like to pray this VE Day:

O God, who would fold both heaven and earth in a single peace; let the design of your great love lighten upon the waste of our wraths and sorrows and give peace to your church, peace among nations, peace in our dwellings and peace in our hearts; through Jesus Christ our Lord.

Amen.

Rogation Sunday (Sunday before Ascension)

In the Anglican Church, Rogation is celebrated on the fifth Sunday after Easter (this year on 25 May). Rogation means an asking of God - for blessing on the seed and land for the year ahead. It is appropriate in any emergency, war, plague, drought or foul weather.

The practice began with the Romans, who invoked the help of the gods Terminus and Ambarvalia. In those days a crowd moved in procession around the cornfields, singing and dancing, sacrificing animals, and driving away Winter with sticks. They wanted to rid the cornfields of evil.

In about 465 the Western world was suffering from earthquake, storm and epidemic. So Mamertius, Bishop of Vienne, aware of the popular pagan custom, ordered that prayers should be said in the ruined or neglected fields on the days leading up to Ascension. With his decision, 'beating the bounds' became a Christian ceremonial.

Rogation-tide arrived in England early in the eighth century and became a fixed and perennial asking for help of the Christian God. On Rogation-tide, a little party would set out to trace the boundaries of the parish. At the head marched the bishop or the priest, with a minor official bearing a Cross, and after them the people of the parish, with schoolboys and their master trailing along. Most of them held slender wands of willow.

At certain points along the route - at well-known landmarks like a bridge or stile or ancient tree, the Cross halted, the party gathered about the priest, and a litany or rogation is said, imploring God to send seasonable wealth, keep the corn and roots and boughs in good health, and bring them to an ample harvest. At some point beer and cheese would be waiting.

In the days when maps were neither common nor accurate, there was much to be said for 'beating the bounds.' It was still very common as late as the reign of Queen Victoria. Certainly, parish boundaries rarely came into dispute, for everyone knew them. (Do you know ours today?)



South Hanningfield Village Hall

Celebrating the 40th Anniversary of the Rebuilding of South Hanningfield Village Hall this May. South Hanningfield Village Hall was originally established after World War One and was an ex-army hut bought by a villager with contributions from local residents. Over the years different social gatherings including Concerts, Dances, Band of

Hope, Women's Institute and a Men's Club were held there. At the end of the Second World War, there was a large bonfire and village hall dance. The hall became a registered charity in 1963. A new village hall was built in 1985 (the 40th anniversary is on 9 May) on the site of the hut which is the current building as it stands today. Here is a logo that has been created to celebrate and mark this important anniversary.

It was:


1700 years ago, 20 May to August 325 that the First Council of Nicaea was held in what is now Iznik, Turkey. It was the first ecumenical council of the Christian Church.

1300 years ago, on 26 May 725 that the Venerable Bede died. This English Benedictine monk, historian, linguist, translator and teacher is known as 'the father of English history'. He helped to popularise the idea of dating years from the birth of Christ (Anno Domini – AD)

200 years ago, on 7 May 1825, that Antonio Salieri died. An Italian composer, he helped to develop operas and taught composers including Liszt, Schubert, Beethoven and Mozart. He was rumoured to have poisoned Mozart, but this was later proven to be false.







150 years ago, on 1 May 1875 that Alexandra Palace in London was officially opened. It became the home of BBC television in 1935.

125 years ago, on 17 May 1900 that during the Second Boer War, the 217-day Siege of Mafeking was relieved by 2000 British forces and South African volunteers. Colonel Robert Baden-Powell, who led the forces defending Mafeking during the siege, became a national hero, and later founded the Scouting movement.

90 years ago, on 19 May 1935 that T. E. Lawrence (Lawrence of Arabia) died in a motorcycle accident, aged 46. A British Army officer, military strategist, archaeologist and writer, he is best known for his activities in the Middle East during WW1.

80 years ago, on 1 May 1945 that German radio announced the death of Adolf Hitler. It was reported he had died a hero's death fighting, but in fact he had committed suicide.

Also 80 years ago, on 8 May 1945 that VE Day took place – marking Victory in Europe at the end of WW2. It was celebrated as a public holiday.

75 years ago, on 13th May 1950 that the first Formula One World Championship race was held, at Silverstone. (Also known as the 1950 British Grand Prix.)

60 years ago, on 21 May 1965 that Sir Geoffrey de Haviland, British aircraft designer and engineer, died.

50 years ago, on 12 May 1975 that Jonah Lomu, New Zealand rugby player was born. Widely regarded as one of the greatest players in the sport. Died 2015.

40 years ago, on 13 May 1985 that the pop album Brothers in Arms by Dire Straits was released. It became the world's most successful album released on compact disc, and the first CD album to sell over a million copies.

30 years ago, on 10 May 1995 that the British Minister for Northern Ireland, Michael Ancram, met representatives of Sinn Fein.

25 years ago, on 4 May 2000 that Ken Livingstone became the first Mayor of London.

Also 25 years ago, on 7 May 2000 that Vladimir Putin was inaugurated as President of Russia.

15 years ago, on 6 May 2010 that the British General Election resulted in a hung parliament. A coalition government was formed on 11 May by the Conservative Party leader, David Cameron, and the Liberal Democrat party leader, Nick Clegg.
